

Florence. April 3<sup>d</sup>. 1866.

My dear Mamma,

Yours of 26<sup>th</sup> reached me on 31<sup>st</sup>, and yours of 29<sup>th</sup> to day. They always arrive at the P.R. late at night so I get them the day after they actually reach Florence.

Madame Barbensi says she has 50 people writing for rooms here this week - the tide ebbing from Rome after the Holy Week; 8 of our party leave this week so there will be a fine supply of new faces. The House holds about 40 when full.

Saturday there <sup>was</sup> a grand show in the Piazza at the Duomo. A wire is stretched from the altar in the Duomo through the nave and out of the door into the Piazza where it is attached to an ornamental stand, hung all over with fireworks and bombs. An image of a white dove is attached to the wire and sent along it by means of a rocket from the altar set into the Piazza, a fresh rocket catches fire as soon as it reaches the stand and drives it back into the Duomo, then all the fireworks go off.

This takes place at noon. Mr Dick and I took charge of four ladies, Mr Dick, Miss Brown and the two young Russian ladies, there was a dense crowd and it was no place for ladies to be on foot, however we did not find out that till we were well wedged into the crowd and had to make the best of it. If all goes right with the flight of the dove it is supposed to indicate a prosperous harvest; if the dove sticks or anything goes wrong, a bad harvest. I was not very close and so could not be quite sure that the above account is accurate in its details but that is what it seemed to be.

This month the railway is to be opened from Ancona to Foligno, thus giving a complete line of railway to Rome, and for those who go from Piedmont and Lombardy, a tolerably direct route i.e. Milan, Parma, Bologna, Ancona, Foligno, Terni and on to Rome. A fine viaduct over the Tiber near Perugia has just been washed down by the floods;

this line was soon to have been opened but this will delay it. Among the new comers here last week are a ~~Mr~~<sup>Mr</sup> Captain and Mrs Penny (Bombay R.E.) who know Haw and Harry, also two Miss Nortons and a clergyman and his wife who were at Bellevue Hotel at Cannes in January. A young lady left this yesterday for Liverpool - going all the way alone, via Leghorn Marseilles &c; though young and rather nice looking she seems quite used to travelling alone when necessary. Seven people are expected here to day and four on Saturday. Yesterday I had a long walk out on the Bologna road and then down into a large valley beyond Fiesole, very bare and wild; it put me in mind of the country about Babyvalley Bridge at Rostrevor. They have started a great number of one hored omnibuses in Florence, they run short distances and the fares are only a halfpenny and a penny; they seem always full. All the streets are

flagged and the busses not large, one horse is quite enough. I see plenty of wild tulips (red) and anemones in the fields about here but flowers in general are not plentiful. I hear that at New York they are going to have a 30 days Quarantine after the 1<sup>st</sup>. of June; 1000 a day is the average of arrivals there so at the end of the first month they will have 30,000 people in Quarantine!

This for Cholera.

My present idea of moving is to leave this - if nothing turns up, on or about April the 16<sup>th</sup>: but I have not much thought of what route I am going to pursue. Most Lewis is the most direct route for London but there are plenty of others available and I should rather like to return via South of France. All this is doubtful but if people ask for my address do not give Florence after April 14<sup>th</sup>.
