PREFACE

At the Ninth Annual Reunion of the Hain Family held on September 15th, 1940, a committee was appointed to arrange for the printing of the record of the descendants of George and Veronica Hain. The basis of this record was the chapter on the Hain Family prepared by Mrs. Frances Hain Swope and printed in the 1935 edition of the History of St. John's (Hain's) Reformed Church, which in turn was to a large extent compiled from the voluminous data relative to the Hain Family gathered by Henry B. Werner, husband of Eve Ann Hain. Over a number of years Mr. Werner showed indefatigable zeal and industry, by making many pedestrian journeys and otherwise, in collecting names, dates and historical facts, and several times felt so greatly discouraged by the many difficulties encountered in obtaining the information needed to make a satisfactory family record that he contemplated relinquishing the task. Being greatly interested in genealogical research, Mrs. Swope assumed the work of elaborating upon and more nearly completing the family record for inclusion in the above mentioned History of St. John's (Hain's) Church. Much credit is also due to Charles Fisher Snyder of Sunbury, Pa., for the record of the descendants of Elizabeth Hain, who married William Fisher.

No person is aware of the difficulties and perplexities experienced in collecting and arranging the genealogy and history of a large family except those who have tried it. From many miles of travel, an extensive correspondence, devotion of much time to the work, and a patient search of records, both public and private, this history has now resulted. It is inevitable that some errors have crept in, but the effort has been to make it as nearly correct as possible. The forebears were a sturdy line of farmers, with occasional merchants, innkeepers, millers, and professional men, all with capable helpmeets, such as form the warp and woof in the durable fabric of our American way of life.

Since it is purely a labor of love, without expectation of any remuneration to those engaged in the patient work, it is hoped that many will be interested in the effort to enable any member of the family to trace his connection with the parent stem. Some twigs and two branches have been lost, but the trunk with the remaining branches of this great family tree are found in the following pages. In the preparation of this family history the belief has constantly been held in mind that a volume, however accurate and complete its birth, marriage and death dates, cannot escape from being monotonous without the addition of supplementary historical, biograph-

ical and anecdotal material. The cost of publication has made it impossible to carry any lineage beyond the 7th generation in this history.

The family name Hain is a derivative of the word Hahn, a Teutonic word for cock. Upon investigating the word Hahn, it is found to be as ancient as the German language itself. It stems from the earlier stage of the German tongue known as Middle High German wherein it appears as 'han'; and in Old High German, the oldest literary period of German, it is written 'hano.' Etymologists compare 'hahn' with the primitive Anglo-Saxon 'hana,' with the Old Icelandic form 'hane,' and the Gothic 'hana.'

As found in deeds, wills and public records, the descendants of George and Veronica Hain spelled their name in various ways, such as Hahn, Hehn, Höhn, Haine, Haein, Hean, Hene, Hen, Hon, Hayns and Hein. Where it is found applied to persons whose identification with the Hain Family is a matter of documentary record, the particular way of spelling may be due either to the unfamiliarity of the individual (if purporting to be his signature) with the customary English spelling of the name, or may be the work of a careless official.

In the monumental two volume work in French by J. B. Rietstap entitled "Armorial General" which contains the descriptions of the coats of arms of thousands of families throughout Europe, it will be observed that "le coq" is the distinctive feature of the coat of arms of sixty-three members of the Hahn Family wherever found and regardless of how spelled.

GEORGE AND VERONICA HAIN

More than two centuries have passed since George and Veronica Hain, with thousands of courageous men and women from a principality in Germany called the Palatinate, braved the perils of sea and forest to establish homes in a new land where they might enjoy freedom without persecution. On landing at New York they were sent to Nuttal's, now Governor's Island, then the quarantine station, to be nursed and recruited for still further trials. In the autumn of 1710, about fifteen hundred were taken up the Hudson and settled on lands purchased from Robert Livingston by the Provincial Council of New York. The story of this group of immigrants has often been told and forms an interesting chapter of the history of New York as well as of Pennsylvania. It must have been a heart-breaking blow for this harassed group of men and women to be deprived of their lands and possessions, first by the continual civil and religious wars in Germany, and then in this country by the English in the New York colony to which they had been sent by Queen Anne. After the unfair treatment received in New York, they believed they could find safety in Pennsylvania. Leaving Schoharie in 1723, thirty-three families (followed by others five years later) traveled in a southwesterly direction through the forests until they reached the Susquehanna River, where they made rafts, and floated down the river to the mouth of the Swatara Creek south of Harrisburg. Thence they worked their way up this stream to the beautiful Lebanon Valley and the region of the Tulpehocken, along which creek they formed settlements. Thus they became pioneers of portions of Berks and Lebanon counties. From a point in the Lebanon Valley probably northwest of Myerstown they moved eastward, some settling in the Womelsdorf community and others finding homes in the Cacoosing section. In Conrad Weiser's diary we read that the early settlements were made without the consent of the Proprietary of Pennsylvania or his commissioners, and against the consent of the Indians; also that for a considerable time they were absolutely without any law or government. The sons of George Hain during several years were far from well disposed towards Conrad Weiser but later became friends.

It is possible that George Hain, who belonged to the New York settlement, came to the Tulpehocken region after the first group had arrived there. His name first appears (as John George Höhn) in Ulster County, New York, where according to the magazine "Ye Old Ulster" there appears among the church records of the Kocherthal colony the following: "Baptized in Schoharie, June 6, 1716,

Johann, born February 8, child of John George and Veronica Hohn. Sponsors, Johann Cast and Commissioner."

The homes of the first settlers were made of logs—these log structures were replaced by more permanent houses in some instances by the second generation but more often by the third generation. The preparations for the replacement of the log houses with the beautiful and substantial stone houses which dot the landscape of the fertile Lebanon Valley was the business of a number of years as stones had to be quarried, and lumber sawed and allowed to season. In such a log house George and Veronica Hain reared their family, and from their home went forth the second generation of the Hain family to establish homes as their father had before them. George Hain possessed the judgment and shrewdness which combined with industry, enable men to acquire and hold property, and in the course of years he became a prosperous and wealthy man for those days. Moreover he was not unmindful of the spiritual needs of his family as well as those of his immediate community. He wisely foresaw that the construction of a place to gather for religious services would result in the regular ministrations of a pastor rather than the irregular visits of a missionary. Such we believe was his purpose in dedicating in 1735 a portion of his ground for the erection and support of a house of worship—that house of worship which succeeding generations have designated "Hain's Church" in his honor.

The following is a statement of the lands George Hain acquired from the Penns as proprietors and from William Allen:

Subsequent to the date of the last of the above enumerated patents it was found after his death, according to receipts in his possession, that George had made payments towards other land as follows:

The land consisting of approximately seventeen hundred acres which George Hain acquired and bequeathed to his children lay on both sides of the present Benjamin Franklin highway, formerly the

Berks and Dauphin Turnpike. On the south side of the highway, the westerly limit of his land was the present State Hospital road; on the north side of the highway, the western limit of George Hain's extensive holdings was the farm now owned by J. Turner Moore, whence it extended in an easterly direction to a corner below the present Hain's Church road near the easterly boundary of the borough of Wernersville. (See the Plan of Original Land Owners on page 7.) According to family tradition George Hain's home was on the site of the beautiful stone residence erected in the early 1800s (probably in 1803) nearly a mile west of Wernersville on what was known for many years as the James S. Hill farm, and now belonging to J. Turner Moore.

George Hain died in 1746, and his wife Veronica about the latter part of 1756, both buried in the oldest part of the Hain's Church graveyard. The very early gravestones were usually limestone or sandstone, both of which disintegrate rapidly when exposed to the elements. The limestones marking the graves of George and Veronica Hain having nearly crumbled to pieces, a new granite marker was erected in 1926 by Mr. and Mrs. Charles I. Hain, descendants. On January 22, 1757, her son Peter Hain and her son-in-law William Fisher were appointed administrators of the estate of Veronica Hain. Her family name is not known.

The will of George Hain, with his name spelled "Hen," was probated April 8, 1746, is on file in the office of the Register of Wills, City Hall, Philadelphia, and reads as follows:

In the Name of the Holy Trinity, Be it Remembered that I, George Hen of Lancaster County, Yeoman, being of sound mind and memory and in good health, thanks be to God for these and all other his mercies, and calling to mind the uncertainty of this transitory Life, Do make this my Last Will and Testament, in manner as follows, viz: Imprimus it is my Will that all my just debts and funeral expenses be fully paid and satisfied. Secondly, it is my Will that my beloved Wife Veronica shall be and remain in possession of my whole Estate as long as she remains Widow, But if she should intermarry then she is to have her Thirds only according to Law. And I do give and bequeath unto my daughter Anna Sibilla One Shilling sterling Money of Great Britain. Item, I do give, devise and bequeath unto my Daughter Elizabeth One Hundred and Fifty acres of land situate on Back Creek adjoining her Husband Willem Fisher's Land.

Item, I do give, devise and bequeath unto my son John Christ my tract of land lying the other side the Run of about One Hundred and fifty acres, with this proviso and upon this condition only, that he shall return and give back the Thirty acres of Land which he contrived to have admeasured to him from Land that was laid out and surveyed unto me, and if not complying with this proviso and condition he the said John Christ shall no ways have the said Land so bequeathed unto him, but instead thereof shall have five shillings Sterling money of Great Britain, and the said Tract of Land so intended for him shall revert to the Estate.


Item, I do give and bequeath unto my son Peter One Shilling Sterling money of Great Britain.

Item, I do give and bequeath unto my son John Adam that Tract of Land of Two Hundred acres which I bought of Marcus moreover I do give, devise and bequeath unto the said John Adam Fifty acres of Land situate and lying by or near the Church.

Item, I do give, devise and bequeath unto my son John Frederick that Place or Tract of Land near Brunnen Kiln containing One Hundred and Eighty-eight acres.

Item, I do give, devise and bequeath unto my son John Henry One Hundred acres of Land which I bought of William Allen and One Hundred acres of Land at the upper end of the said Tract which I took up from the Proprietors both lying and situate in Dry Creek near my dwelling house.

Item, I do give, devise and bequeath unto my son John Casper the Plantation where I live upon Dry Creek containing Two Hundred Acres together with all buildings and Improvements thereon.

Item, I do give, devise and bequeath unto my Two last named sons John Henry and John Casper that Tract of Land adjoining William Allen's Land by the Hill containing One Hundred and Twenty-six acres to be equally used or divided between them, and I Do hereby nominate and appoint my said beloved Wife Veronica and Thomas Edwards, Esqre, to be Executors of this my last Will and Testament by me made and do declare this and no other to be my last Will and Testament.

In Witness whereof I the said George Henn have hereunto set my hand and seal this seventh day of November in the seventeenth year of his Majesty's Reign Anno Domino 1743.

(Note—The figures to the right of a name indicate the generation. Thus Anna Sabilla Hain Freymeyer (2) means that she belongs to the second generation.)

A deed made May 6, 1776, between John Freymeyer and Elizabeth, his wife, of the one part, and Henry Freymeyer and Catherine, his wife, of the other part, recites that John and Henry are millers in Cumru township which at that time extended to the Tulpehocken Creek.

By deed dated Feb. 23, 1741, (recorded in Berks Deed Book B2, page 484) George Hain and Veronica, his wife, in consideration of 24 pounds and ten shillings conveyed to Jacob Freymeyer of Cumru township 100 acres of land on Tulpehocken Creek. George signed his name in German characters Gorg Hen, and Veronica signed by her mark.

In the Berks County office of the Register of Wills, it is recorded (Administration Vol. 4, page 18) that on June 6, 1785, letters of administration of the estate of Sabilla Freymeyer were granted "to Christian Freymeyer, eldest son of Sabilla Freymeyer, late of Berks County, widow deceased, and to Henry Gicker son-in-law of said deceased." An inventory filed Oct. 13, 1785, fixed the value of her goods and chattels at four pounds, ten shillings and four pence. A similar inventory filed Feb. 24, 1778, fixed the value of Jacob Freymeyer's goods and chattels at eight hundred and four pounds eight shillings and six pence, made up largely of seven bonds for 50 pounds each against John and Henry, and one for 25 pounds against Christian, dated May 27, 1767, which bonds probably were part of the purchase price of the above mentioned 100 acre tract, the deed for which bears date June 10, 1767 (recorded in Deed Book B2, page 486), is made between Jacob Freymeyer and Hannah (the Biblical form of Anna) his wife, of the one part, and John Freymeyer and Henry Freymeyer, both of Cumru Township, of the other part, recites a consideration of 700 pounds, and is made to the sons as tenants in common, not as joint tenants.

(II) ELIZABETH GERTRUDE HAIN (2) LINEAGE

Elizabeth Gertrude Hain (2) was born in 1711, probably at Livingston Manor, N. Y., as the name of her father appears on the list of the Palatines who were there in 1710-11, under indenture to Queen Anne, engaged in producing naval stores in order to repay the expenses of their transportation from England. She married William Fisher, the immigrant progenitor of the Fisher family which has been identified with Hain's Church and its neighboring communities from pioneer days. He was born April 11, 1706, in the Palatinate. In 1733 he left his home at Langenselbohl, near Hanau in Hesse Cassel, according to a document in the nature of a modern passport given to him by the Chancellor of the Right Hon. Count and Lord Sir Wolfgang Ernst, Count of Isenberg and Biedingen, an English translation of which was published on page 24 of the History of Hain's Church printed in 1916. He arrived in Philadelphia on August 17, 1733, on the ship Samuel of London, Hugh Percy, master, from Rotterdam, with a total of 291 Palatines on board. Probably late in the year of his arrival he married Elizabeth Gertrude Hain. He became the owner of about one thousand acres of land in what are today Lower Heidelberg and Spring Townships, Berks County. In 1752 and 1760 he was an elder of Hain's Church, and both William and Elizabeth Gertrude are buried close to the southwest corner of the church near the graves of her parents. The old red sandstones marking their graves contain the following inscriptions:

Their descendants, in 1932, erected and unveiled at these graves a granite boulder with a bronze tablet, which was dedicated in 1933, marking the 200th anniversary of the arrival of William Fisher in America. The German spelling of the name was Wilhelm Fischer. The ending "in" in her name on the above inscription is the feminine ending in German.

As recorded on the tombstones, Wilhelm and Elizabeth had eleven children, eight sons and three daughters. This is further veri-

fied by his will in Berks County Will Book Z, page 132; also Will Book 2, page 9. They were:

- (1) Elizabeth Gertrude (3), born about 1734. She married John Heckert, referred to by Wilhelm in his will as his son-in-law, and who was a deacon at Hain's Church in 1763.
- (2) Peter Fischer (3), born September 8, 1735, died November 23, 1787, buried at Hain's Church about fifty feet west of his parents. He married Appolonia Heckert, daughter of Michael Heckert, in 1758, according to records of Rev. Waldschmidt (Penna. Archives, 6th Series, Volume VI, page 219). Peter was a deacon at Hain's Church in 1764. His will is recorded in Berks County Will Book 2A, page 161, proven March 11, 1788. He owned and lived on the farm about one half mile east of Wernersville, subsequently occupied by Abraham H. Miller and wife Eleanor Hain (6).
- (3) Philip Fischer (3), born September 25, 1736, died August 14, 1803, buried at Hain's Church. His wife was Anna Maria Marshall. His will, made July 12, 1803, is recorded in Berks County.
- (4) John Fischer (3), born May 1739, died 1812. He lived in Heidelberg Township. Married to Anna Catharine Marshall. His will is recorded in Will Book D, page 26, proven March 19, 1812.
- (5) Henry Fischer (3), born 1739, died 1822. He was married to Christina Durst on September 28, 1761, by Rev. Waldschmidt. He was a deacon at Hain's Church in 1778.
- (6) Michael Fischer (3), born 1743, died 1822. He married Catharine Bollman. They lived in Spring Township, Berks County.
- (7) Susanna Fischer (3), born about 1743, married George Hill, died 1791.
- (8) Rosina Fischer (3), born about 1745, married April 10, 1764, to Peter Grauel, son of Michael Grauel, by Rev. Waldschmidt.
- (9) Frantz Fischer (3), born May, 1747.
- (10) Frederick Fischer (3), born May 5, 1750, died October 17, 1828, buried at Hain's Church. He was married to Gertrude Faust on May 18, 1775, and lived in Spring Township, Berks County, where he was a farmer and a blacksmith.
- (11) John George Fischer (3), born May 31, 1752, married Catharine

The record of the christening of the last three may be found on pages 28-29 of the 1916 History of Hain's Church.

The eight sons of Wilhelm Fischer all served in the Continental Army during the Revolution. As can be expected, some served various enlistments at various times, according to the emergency; but it is worthy of note that at one time six of these sons served in the same company, as is evidenced by a return of Captain Sebastian Miller's Company of Berks County Militia under Colonel Joseph Hiester on May 31, 1781, in which appear the names of John, Henry, Friedrich, Georg, Pitter, and Michael Fisher (Pa. Arch., 5th Series, vol. V., pg. 211), while Frantz Fisher is noted in a regiment of the Continental Line and Philip Fisher in the German Regiment. The Revolutionary War tablet on the wall of Hain's Church mentions Frederic, Michael, Peter, Sr., Peter, Jr., and Philip Fisher.

(1) ELIZABETH GERTRUDE (3) (the eldest daughter of Wilhelm and Elizabeth Gertrude Hain Fischer), married John

Heckert. The records of their childrens' baptisms may be found on pages 30, 31, 80 and 81 of the 1916 History of Hain's Church. Following her parents' death, they migrated to Northumberland County and settled on land along Mahantango Creek, for which they had a deed recorded in 1774. Many of their descendants live in that locality.

(2) PETER FISCHER (3), (the eldest son of Wilhelm Fischer) and his wife, Appolonia, were the parents of six sons and three daughters, as follows, the records of the christenings of most of them being recorded on pages 69 and 70 of the 1916 History of Hain's Church:

1. Henry Fischer (4), born December 9, 1758, died June 21, 1823, married Susanna Ruth, daughter of Christian Ruth. Henry left Heidelberg Township in 1791 for Oley Township, where in 1801 he built the beautiful Fisher home, regarded as one of the best examples of Colonial architecture, now the home of his great-grandson, Daniel D. Fisher (7). Henry had the following children:
 - a. Mary Fisher (5), born August 15, 1790, died February 27, 1830, married Henry S. Spang, a pioneer ironmaster at Mt. Aetna Furnace, Huntington County, Pennsylvania.

- b. Samuel Fisher (5), born November 13, 1791, died Mar. 15, 1824, lived in Oley.
 - c. Sarah Fisher (5), who married Jacob V. R. Hunter, of Reading, who was the owner of Sally Ann Furnace, in Rockland Township, which he named in her honor, according to tradition. She was born Sept. 1, 1793, died Mar. 21, 1867.
 - d. Henry Fisher (5), of Oley Township, born May 10, 1801.
 - e. John Fisher (5), born Jan. 22, 1798, died Oct. 24, 1828. He married Margaret Spang; lived in Hereford Township.
 - f. Daniel Fisher (5), born June 22, 1795, died July 16, 1839, married Mary, usually called Polly, Gernand (1802-1878). Their son John G. Fisher (6), born June 22, 1824, being the father of Daniel D. Fisher (7) of Oley.
2. Rosina Fisher (4), born January 13, 1761, died Jan. 20, 1815, married Valentine Mosser, buried at Epler's Church.
 3. Peter Fisher, Jr. (4), born November 25, 1761. He served during the Revolution in the same company with his father, Captain John Ludwig's Company in 1780, 6th Battalion, Berks County Militia. (Penna. Arch., 5th Series, Vol. V, p. 238.) No record of his children, if any.
 4. Michael Fisher (4), born June 10, 1763.
 5. John Fisher (4), born about 1764. Married Rosina Hain on March 21, 1796 (1778-1827), the daughter of John and Anna Maria (Gushwa) Hain. John Fisher was a deacon at Hain's Church in 1793. His homestead was on the farm still owned by his great-grandson, Samuel R. Fisher (7), of Wernersville. It lies in the valley of Spring Creek midway between Hain's Church and Robesonia. Here in the early 1800's, John Fisher established a paper mill, which was one of the leading industries of the section at that day. He had a family of eleven children, six sons and five daughters, as follows:

 - d. Anna Catharine Fisher (5), born September 12, 1804, married David Wenrich.
 - e. Elizabeth Fisher (5), born October 6, 1805, died January 5, 1809.
 - f. John Fisher (5), born March 15, 1808, died April 23, 1809.
 - g. Anna Fisher (5), born March 17, 1810, married Peter Klopp.
 - h. Elijah Fisher (5), born August 28, 1812, married Caroline Shower.
 - i. Daniel Fisher (5), born October 10, 1815, married ——— Zerby.
 - j. Sarah Fisher (5), born March 2, 1818, married John Reber.
 - k. Jeremiah Fisher (5), born January 9, 1821, died July 7, 1876, married Leah Beidler.
 6. Elizabeth Fisher (4), born January 19, 1766. No further information.
 7. George Fisher (4), born about 1767. No further information.
 8. Catharine Fisher (4), born March 11, 1769. No further information.

9. William Fisher (4), born June 20, 1773, died June 20, 1847. In May, 1790, he married Margaret Spohn. They lived on a farm a short distance north of Hain's Church. This was an early Hain property which came into the possession of William Fisher and wife. Here they built in 1820, the large stone barn still in excellent condition, and here their family was reared. Margaret Spohn, the wife of William Fisher, was born September 29, 1770, and died December 5, 1846. She was the daughter of Lieutenant John Philip Spohn (1737-1807), who was 1st Lieutenant of the 8th Company, 4th Battalion, Berks County Militia in the Revolution, a member of Hain's Church and buried in the church yard there. His wife was Maria Krick, and his father, Adam Spohn (1699-1766), who was an elder of Hain's Church in 1757. William Fisher and his wife, Margaret (Spohn) Fisher, are buried at Hain's Church, their graves being about fifty feet west of his grandparents, Wilhelm Fischer and wife, and being marked by a large tablet in the form known as "Cavalier Table". They had a family of fifteen children, nine sons and six daughters, as follows:

 - g. Mary Fisher (5), born October 7, 1801, married Daniel Stout.
 - h. Susanna Fisher (5), born September 19, 1802, married William Shafer.
 - i. (Rev.) Peter S. Fisher (5), born October 11, 1804, died May 22, 1873.
 - j. Henry Fisher (5), born July 6, 1806, died in infancy.
 - k. Abraham Fisher (5), born April 12, 1808, died January 26, 1843, married Susanna Schumacher.
 - l. Abigail Fisher (5), born February 18, 1810, died December 7, 1831, married George Obald.
 - m. Rebecca Fisher (5), born January 27, 1812, married first George Obald, second — Fink.
 - n. Charles W. Fisher (5), born February 19, 1815, died April 23, 1893, married Mary Cathcart.
 - o. Lovina Fisher (5), born June 30, 1817, married Henry Moyer.

The fifth son of William and Margaret Fisher (4), was Adam Fisher (5). On February 22, 1827, he married Mary Magdalene Brossman, daughter of John Brossman, of Bernville. They lived about a half mile east of Wernersville until 1842, when they loaded their possessions on a canal boat of the old Union Canal, going to Lewistown, whence they were transported over the mountains in Conestoga wagons into Centre County, where they located at Farmer's Mills. Adam Fisher engaged in milling and merchandising. His only son, who grew to manhood, was Major Jared B. Fisher (6), who was born October 3, 1829. At an early age he began a mercantile business of his own at Penn Hall, Centre County, Pennsylvania, which he continued for fifty years until his death, December 28, 1895. Both Adam Fisher and his son, Jared, are buried at Salem Reformed Church near Penn Hall. Jared B. Fisher married November 23, 1854, Sarah Louise Weaver, and they were

the grandparents of the writer (7) of this sketch of the Elizabeth Hain descendants.

The sixth son of William and Margaret Fisher was Rev. Peter S. Fisher (5), born October 11, 1804, who became a man of much prominence in the Reformed Church of his day. On April 7, 1829, he married Frances Veronica Heckert at Linglestown, they were the parents of eleven children, nine sons and two daughters. Of the sons, three became doctors, each held in great esteem throughout his community: Dr. Alfred I. Fisher (6), at McAllisterville, Juniata County; Dr. Calvin P. W. Fisher (6), at Boalsburg, Centre County, and Dr. Philip S. Fisher (6), of Zion, Centre County, Pennsylvania. Another son, B. Frank Fisher (6), rose to the rank of General as chief of the Signal Corps of the Army of the Potomac during the Civil War, being at one time captured and confined for eight months in Libby Prison, from which he managed to escape and reach the Union lines; being one of the very few who ever succeeded in this daring venture. Following the war he became a prominent member of the Philadelphia Bar. Another son, Lieutenant John H. Fisher (6), of the 138th Pennsylvania, fell on May 6, 1864, at the Wilderness, gallantly leading advance skirmishes in a charge upon the enemy's lines. Still another son passed on in 1932 at the age of 84 years, the Right Rev. Monsignor Nevin H. Fisher (6), Vicar General of the Roman Catholic Church in Philadelphia, having been educated and ordained as a Reformed minister, but being converted to the Catholic faith while abroad. One of the daughters, Margaret (6), became the wife of Dr. I. J. Wireback and died in 1928 at the age of 89 years.

The eighth son of William (4) and Margaret Fisher was Abraham Fisher (5), who was a deacon at Hain's Church in 1842. He married Susanna Schumacher, and both he and his wife are buried in the church yard at Hain's Church.

(3) PHILIP FISCHER (3), (the second son of Wilhelm Fischer) and his wife, Anna Maria, had the following children:

9. John Jacob Fisher (4), born Sept. 18, 1788.

(7, 8, 9 and 11) We have no record as yet of the children and grandchildren of Susanna (3), Rosina (3), Frantz (3) and John George Fischer (3).

wood, Pennsylvania, where both are buried. Daniel Koch died January 7, 1903. Their children were: Harriet, Francis Daniel, Allen, Jeremiah, Albert, Sarah Maria, Richard Henry, Emanuel, Arenius Glen, Catherine Mary, and Ambrose Ellsworth. Francis Daniel was Captain Company I, 48th Penna. Veteran Volunteers in the Civil War.

Richard Henry Koch (6) born April 2, 1852, served as Judge of the Schuylkill County Courts for twenty years and is now a Retired Judge, residing at Pottsville. He married Annie Phillips (1884-1925) and has eight grandchildren. His daughter, Helen Elizabeth (7) is married to Com. Joel T. Boone, M.D., the White House Physician under President Hoover. He had been Assistant White House Physician under Presidents Harding and Coolidge.

- d. Lydia Beck (5), born November 11, 1819, died April 8, 1903, married William Reed in August, 1842. They lived at Pottsgrove, Northumberland County. Buried at Chillisquaque Burial Ground, Northumberland County, Pa. Their children were Emanuel and Kate.
 - e. Sarah Beck (5), born September 22, 1821, died March 24, 1864, married William Fegley. They lived at Lewisburg, Pa. Buried at Lewisburg Cemetery, Lewisburg, Penna. Their children were: Clorinda, Emanuel Fisher, George Alexander, John Allen.
 - f. Catharine Beck (5), born June 26, 1823, died August 27, 1911, married John Simpson Maus. She is buried at Centre Church Cemetery, Montour County. No children.
 - g. Samuel Beck (5), born February 4, 1825, died March 11, 1903, married Ann Mull on September 21, 1861, buried at White Deer Lutheran Cemetery. Children: John A., Catharine.
 - h. Susanna Beck (5), born October 5, 1826, died January 12, 1897, married Daniel Messersmith. Buried at Centre Church Cemetery, Liberty Township, Montour County. Children: John, Charles.
 - i. Caroline Beck (5), born November 25, 1832, died November 6, 1901, married John Geist. Buried at Mount Vernon Cemetery, South Danville, Pa. Children: Martha Jane, Sarah C., Daniel Wesley.
8. Jonathan Fisher (4), born March 31, 1794, died October 14, 1854. He is buried at Kissinger's Church to the erection of which he largely contributed in 1852. Married Maria Magdalena Baum, (1801-1869). His children were:

 - b. Amelia (5), married Harrison Reber of Bern Township, buried at Epler's Church.
 - c. Henry Fisher (5). He lived on the homestead in Spring Township, Berks County.

 - e. Elijah Fisher (5), born 1821, died 1853.

In this sketch it has not been endeavored to carry the lineage beyond the 5th generation except in a few special cases. The Fishers have met in an Annual Reunion for over twenty years at Hain's Church, and their genealogist has listed over two thousand names of descendants of Wilhelm Fisher and Elizabeth Gertrude Hain.

(III) JOHN CHRISTIAN HAIN (2) LINEAGE

John Christian Hain (2), son of George and Veronica Hain, was married to Maria Barbara. The year of their birth and place of burial are not known. Christian died October 25, 1771. Maria Barbara died Jan. 9, 1802. As six of the sons of George and Veronica were given the first name John, they were usually designated by their second given names.

Tradition has it that Christian Hain owned two farms situated about one-half mile southwest of Wernersville. These farms may have included land he acquired from the Penns, the dates of the warrants are as follows:

March 30, 1743	50 acres
December 23, 1743	50 acres
October 12, 1748	20 acres

In 1767 the name of Christian Hain appears on the State tax list as having been taxed for 50 acres of land, two horses and one head of cattle—for the year 1768 he is taxed for 150 acres of land, four horses and four head of cattle. Christian Hain probably died in middle life for on Dec. 7, 1772, in Berks County Orphans' Court Records, vol. 2, page 142, the names of four of his children are listed as minors, and George is stated to be the eldest son.

Sampson Hain served in the War of the Revolution in 1777 as a private in the Sixth Company, of Heidelberg, Fourth Battalion, formed May, 1777. He is supposed at one time to have owned the Henry Bennetch farm, and for quite a few years lived with his family in Paxton Township, Dauphin County. On January 28, 1799, Sampson Hain purchased from Peter Wenrich, an innkeeper of Paxton Township, Dauphin County, a tavern house and 93 acres of land situated at Thomastown (now Linglestown) adjoining lands of Alexander McHargue, Casper Hinkle, Francis Wenrich, Thomas Lingle and Michael Walburn, for the sum of 1010 lbs. in gold or silver. He took possession of this property in April, 1799. On May 14, 1803, Sampson Hain gave a mortgage deed to Fred Hain (his cousin and son of John Henry Hain) of Heidelberg Township for 500 lbs. in discharge of a certain recited obligation on the above mentioned 93 acres of land. This farm evidently passed into the possession of Fred Hain for by articles of agreement dated August 5, 1803, we find that John Hain (miller, son of Peter, and another cousin) of Heidelberg Township, bought for 1300 pounds sterling from Frederick Hain, 93 acres of land on which the said John Hain lived, having rented the house and one acre of land February 24, 1803, from Sampson Hain, together with three lots 1, 2 and 3 in said town of Thomastown, deed to be executed and delivered on or before May 1, 1804. Sampson Hain and his family may have returned to Berks County as no trace has been found of any of his descendants living in Dauphin or adjoining counties.

(3) ABRAHAM HAIN (3) was carried on the State Tax lists as a single man for the years 1779 and 1780. No property was listed. He served from Berks County in the Revolutionary War in the year 1780, as a private in Captain Charles Gobin's Company, Sixth Battalion of County Militia. He died March 21, 1824, aged 72 years.

(4) ROSINA HAIN (3) born 1754, was married on March 6, 1775, to Abraham Rheem, according to the records of the Cocalico (Lancaster County) Reformed Church. Children:

(IV) PETER HAIN (2) LINEAGE

Peter Hain (2) (miller), son of George and Veronica Hain, was born between the years 1713 and 1715. He married Barbara Weiss. Peter died during the summer of 1757 and his widow later married Andreas Gerberich—they were the progenitors of the Gerberich family of Lebanon County. At the time of his death Peter owned 600 acres of land valued at 1800 lbs. and paid second highest tax in Heidelberg Township, with

(1) JOHN HAIN (3) (miller) son of Peter and Barbara Weiss Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, Berks County, August 12, 1740, and died in Middle Paxton Township, Dauphin County, September 18, 1815. He married Esther Guschwa, October 25, 1768. She was a daughter of Isaac Guschwa (a Huguenot refugee in the Palatinate who came to America September 19, 1732) and a sister of Anna Maria Guschwa, the wife of his cousin, Adam Hain. Esther Guschwa was born February 2, 1751, and died July 28, 1820. They are both buried on a plot set aside for a cemetery on the farm they owned in Middle Paxton Township.

John was just sixteen years of age at the time of his father's death—we find he appeared at the Orphans' Court of Berks County asking that his uncle, John Henry Hain, be made his guardian. Later he (John) became administrator of his father's estate. During the later years of the 18th century John and Esther sold their lands in Berks County and moved to Thomastown and purchased from their cousin, Frederick Hain, a farm of 93 acres. Over a period of ten or twelve years the names of John and Esther Hain and their family appear on the records of Wenrich's Church. In 1810 or thereabouts John Hain purchased a farm of 600 acres beginning at the western end of what is now Dauphin Borough in Dauphin County, and extending along the present highway to Speeceville. He served in the Revolutionary War. Their children were:

- b. Anna Margaret Hain (4), daughter of John and Esther (Guschwa) Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, Berks County, 1774, baptized August 17, 1774, sponsors, John and Anna Margaret Hain. She married Frederick Barnett, born in Cumberland County, May 1, 1771, died Feb. 15, 1846. The Barnetts owned a large tract of land two miles south of the present town of Duncannon, where they are buried. Anna Margaret died Aug. 22, 1821. The descendants of Frederick and Anna Margaret are very widely scattered throughout the United States. Four of their sons, William, John, Isaac and Daniel Barnett with their wives and several small children went west in 1836 in Conestoga wagons drawn by oxen.

An amusing tale is told of how Daniel concealed his gold in the crevices between the logs of his house, a fact which was known in the community, and one night two unidentified men forced an entrance. However, Daniel and Mary were large people and succeeded in driving the men away. The next day they decided their gold would be far safer in a bank—so upon advice of their very dear friend, Daniel Poffenberger, they deposited the money in the Harrisburg Bank.

- h. Catharine Hain (4), daughter of John and Esther (Guschwa) Hain, was born June 18, 1791, in Heidelberg Township, Berks County. She was married to John Phillip Fetterhoff, of Halifax, Dauphin County—a member of the family for which Fetterhoff's Church was named. (3) MAXIMILIAN HAIN (3), son of Peter and Barbara (Weiss) Hain, was born 1745 in Heidelberg Township, Berks County, and became a member by confirmation in 1766 of the Caucasus Church after the death of his father. In 1777 Max served as First Sergeant, County Militia of Northumberland County. He died unmarried.

(4) ANNA MARGARET HAIN (3), daughter of Peter and Barbara (Weiss) Hain, was born 1748, baptized July 3, 1748, in Heidelberg Township, Berks County, and was married to Peter Ruth April 5, 1768. Berks County Court records show that papers of administration were granted to his wife, Anna Margaret (Hain) Ruth, September 26, 1785. On August 15, 1786, Anna Margaret married John Nicholas Mosser. He was born 1738, died 1824. Anna Margaret died June 16, 1816, and is buried at Hain's Church. There is no definite record of children by either marriage.

(5) SUSANNA HAIN (3), daughter of Peter and Barbara (Weiss) Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, Berks County, 1750, baptized November 17, 1750, sponsors, Frederick Miller and wife, Susanna. She was married to Valentine Urich, a soldier of the Revolutionary War from Lebanon County and a son of Valentine and Agatha (Volsin) Urich. Valentine and Susanna owned a large tract of land in the vicinity of Myerstown and were reputed very wealthy according to the standards of that day. There is a yarn about Susanna wearing a shawl on which were sewed pieces of gold coins. They are buried at Klopp's Church.

In the Orphans' Court records of Berks County we find that John George was about seven months old at the time of his father's death and at 14 years of age he requested that John Heckert be appointed his guardian. It is supposed that George Hain went to Dauphin County either with his guardian or with his elder brothers, John and Henry. In 1781 we find him serving in the Continental Army, Lancaster County Militia, Ninth Battalion. He was married about 1780 to Catharine Miller, daughter of John Miller, of Dauphin County. Upon his return from the army he purchased a tract of 200 acres near Harrisburg—to this land he added about 500 acres. On the records of Shoop's Lutheran and Reformed Church we find appearing the names of George and Catharine (Miller) Hain. George died May 22, 1832, and he and Catharine are buried in the graveyard adjoining the church. They were the progenitors of the Hain family in Dauphin County.




On March 18, 1777, George enlisted in the 13th Pennsylvania Regiment, Continental Line. He was also a deacon of Hain's Church in 1782. George and Mary Magdalena Hain's land included the farm now owned by Mrs. Florence Rick Frame, also 300 acres near Fritz-town. In 1802 George Hain built the beautiful stone house on the farm, the work of construction being done by the same German craftsman who built the Henry Fisher house of equal beauty in Oley Township. The house is a fine example of Colonial architecture and includes several unusual features, one of which (shown in the 1916 History of Hain's Church) is a room referred to as a "chapel" designed for religious meetings. At the time of George Hain's death this farm came into possession of his son, William, who was married to Anne Hain. Children by second marriage:

(VI) JOHN ADAM HAIN (2) LINEAGE

John Adam Hain (2), son of George and Veronica Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, Berks County (then Lancaster County), and was married to Anna Magdalena Heckert, born October, 1723. In 1757 the tax lists of Berks County show Adam Hain as paying £24 tax or the third highest taxpayer in Heidelberg Township. Adam Hain made a will dated July 1, 1773, in which John Hain (son) and Conrad Kershner were named the executors, and the land situated in Heidelberg Township was divided March 25, 1784. Adam died about 1783 and Magdalena died May 9, 1796.

(1) JOHN or JOHANNES HAIN (3), son of John Adam and Anna Magdalena (Heckert) Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, January 21, 1747. He married Anna Margareta Guschwa, daughter of Isaac Guschwa, May 15, 1769. It is a family tradition that she was born in Virginia, April, 1747, that she was a blonde, and that she met John Hain at Harrisburg, also that she had two colored servants. She made her home for two years with her grandson, John Adam Hain, and his wife in their home in Wernersville, which they built in 1816. It was during this time that her brother from Virginia came to visit her traveling in a carriage with a colored footman. In Pennsylvania Archives, Series 6, Volume 6, page 269, we find that Johannes, son of Adam, received communion at Cacusy Church for the first time April 3, 1763. He was a soldier in the war of the Revolution (Pennsylvania Archives, Third Series, Volume 6, page 211). His name appears on the tablet placed on Hain's Church by the Berks County Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. Johannes died November 21, 1800. Anna Margareta died April 17, 1820. She was born in Cumru Township Nov. 25, 1799 and died Jan. 6, 1882. John died Jan. 4, 1865. Both are buried in the old graveyard at Hain's Church of which he was an official member. On their tombstones his name is carved "Johannes A. Hehn" and hers "Catharina Hehn." In 1816 John built the existing fine stone house on his farm on the northerly side of Wernersville in which he died. This stone house replaced an earlier log house which some years after its erection was pebble-dashed or stuccoed. Several hundred feet southwest of the present stone house there was a two-story and attic stone spring-house in which the widowed mother Anna Maria lived with a maid servant after John and Catharine had moved into his new house. Later the spring-house was occupied by farm laborers and accordingly was known as a "knecht house" or "lehn's house." The farm was large, extending to what was the Berks and Dauphin Turnpike on the south, to the Richard Hain (5) farm (now owned by Dr. S. S. Hill) on the west, and to the farm of William Werner (the founder of Wernersville) on the east. The old Center Hotel in Wernersville, which was razed to the ground in 1895, was also owned by John and until 1875 operated successively by three of his sons-in-law. It is remarkable how many handsome stone farm houses were built in old Heidelberg Township by members of the Hain family early in the last century.

He became the owner of a farm of his father's, formerly owned by John Keim, together with a gun barrel factory on the same farm on Spring Creek one and a half miles northwest of Wernersville, where he resided until his death. He converted the gun factory

into a foundry where castings were made and repairing of farm machinery and other work was done. Later he enlarged the building for the manufacture of woolen goods, carpets and carpet yarns. He was elected a county prison inspector 1875-1878. He died August 3, 1882, buried at Hain's Church.

(VII) JOHN FREDERICK HAIN (2) LINEAGE

John Frederick Hain (2), son of George and Veronica Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, married Anna Elizabeth (probably Ermentrout). Henry Hain was a staunch patriot and during the Revolutionary War was almost a fanatic in the cause of freedom. Upon hearing of Benedict Arnold's treason in the fall of 1780, he insisted that all his sons enlist. He went with them and endeavored to enlist also, but Colonel Broadhead persuaded him to return home saying, "It is a shame to suffer so old a man to perform the arduous duties of a soldier." In the years 1767, 1768 and 1769 the tax records of Berks County show Henry Hain paying tax in Heidelberg Township on 200 acres of land, and at the time of his death the farm now owned by Dr. Samuel S. (2) FREDERICK HAIN (3), son of John Henry and Anna Christina Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, Berks County, September 15, 1750, baptized September 16, 1750, sponsor, Fred Hain (uncle). In 1773 he married Anna Maria Eckert. It is a family tradition she came from Germany when 12 years old. She was born February 2, 1753, died August 15, 1844. Frederick died June 23, 1839. Both are buried at Hain's Church.

Frederick Hain was a miller and served as a sergeant in the Revolutionary War. On August 5, 1834, at the age of 84 years, Frederick appeared before the Common Pleas Court of Berks County asking for a pension for his service during the war—stating that "In December, 1776, he took a bounty of 50 shillings from Valentine Eckert and became enrolled in Captain Fisher's Company, First

Regiment of Pennsylvania Line commanded by Colonel Broadhead. This Company remained only a few days in Reading and then marched to join the remaining part of the Regiment located in Philadelphia or nearby. From this point the Company was ordered to Trenton and that he was one of the guards to conduct the Hessian prisoners from Trenton to Reading. Also in company with his brother Daniel, and Mathias Wenrich done recruiting throughout the County and in Reading." Frederick in this petition also mentions that his servants and team of horses were constantly at the service of the government. The pension was not granted for the reason that his commission was lost while on a hunting excursion, and there was no one living who would be able to swear to his three years' service with the army. In 1802 Frederick Hain built the beautiful and substantial stone house 30½ by 68 feet, now the property of the Wernersville State Hospital. Children of Frederick and Anna Maria (Eckert) Hain:

Benjamin was tall and slender, quiet in manner and on Sundays driving in his buggy to church well dressed, wearing a shiny silk high hat, he was quite the country gentleman. In his will dated March 14, 1854, he made the following provision for his wife: "I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Eve during her natural life the three rooms with privilege in the kitchen, garret, cellar and vault in the yard, bake-oven and smoke-house, and free egress and regress as at present occupied and used by us. I give her also two milch cows to be kept for her summer and winter by the possessor of my plantation with his own; also two fat hogs, and the one-half of a fat beef, to be slaughtered in season; also as many apples, chickens and eggs as she may want to use; also as much fire wood cut." The will further provided that the bequest of the homestead to son Frederick was subject to his paying Eve one hundred dollars annually, and to the payment to daughter Anna Mary, wife of Joseph Hain, of \$4,000. at the rate of \$200. annually, without interest.

Besides farming, Benjamin engaged in hauling iron ore from the Cornwall ore mines in Lebanon County to the Robesonia furnace with a six horse team during 1849-1851, making one trip in two days. He also hauled coal from Reading. Coming down a hill near Cornwall the wheel braking chains gave way one day, and the horses not being able to hold the heavily loaded wagon ran down the hill, resulting in the killing of two horses. After that he ceased hauling ore. In February, 1846, he purchased from Henry P. Robeson and Clement Brooke five tracts of timber and mountain land aggregating 628 acres situated in what was then Lower Heidelberg Township, adjoining the Berks and Dauphin Turnpike, land of the Reading Furnace (as the furnace at Robesonia was called for fifty years), David L. Wenrich, George Gernant, Isaac Hain, and others.

- aa. Anna Mary Hain (5), was born January 14, 1818, married October 27, 1836, to Joseph Hain, son of Benjamin S. and Elizabeth (Hain) Hain. Joseph Hain died May 16, 1865. After his marriage Frederick continued on his father's farm until the spring of 1865, when he moved into his sister's house on the west side of the road leading from the east end of Wernersville to Hain's Church. A new three story stone grist mill having been built in 1861 on the farm inherited from his father, Frederick engaged in grain dealing and milling 1865-1867 in partnership with Henry H. Hoover. In the spring of 1867 he again moved upon his farm and remained there until the spring of 1872, when he moved into the Center Hotel in Wernersville belonging to his father-in-law's estate. He continued to operate the hotel, in which the post-office was also located, until his death. His widow continued in the management of the hotel until 1876 when she bought the frame residence of Charles Landis, tobacconist, a short distance west of the hotel on the then turnpike, and occupied it until her death.

Under the terms of his father's will (Berks County Register of Wills Office, vol. 10, page 407), Frederick became the owner of the old homestead and farm of 177 acres, the grist and sawmill adjoining the farm, and six tracts of wood and pasture land lying on the mountain

along the south side of the farm. He owned the farm and adjoining tracts of land aggregating nearly 400 acres until his death. On the farm (which was subsequently purchased by one of Frederick's sons, Henry H., and by him sold to the State of Pennsylvania for the Wernersville State Hospital), there was a distillery which was operated almost one hundred years, as existing records show that Frederick Hain (3) was taxed for two stills in 1779. Applejack, peach brandy, and probably rye whisky, were made here by Frederick (3), Benjamin (4), and Frederick (5).—the last was made in 1872 by Frederick (5). Early farm history shows that there was a time when there were more than 200 distilleries in Berks County. That was in "ye olden days" when on practically every farm there was located a small distillery, and instead of hauling the rye to the mills or to the city for shipment to other points, the grain was manufactured into whisky right on the farm and then during the winter months the liquor was sold. Farmers in Berks made trips to Philadelphia by team, requiring from 4 to 7 days, carrying several hundred gallons of rye whisky, which was disposed of as low as 18 cents a gallon. The customs revenues being insufficient to discharge the debts of the national government, Andrew Hamilton, the Secretary of the Treasury, secured the enactment of the first excise tax in March 1791. Although the rates were moderate, the act gave rise to much opposition particularly in western Pennsylvania, where, in 1794, a display of military force was necessary to put an end to the Whisky Insurrection. Revenue from customs supplying all needs in 1801, the excise law was abolished during the year of Thomas Jefferson's inauguration. It was revived in 1813, during the War of 1812, and again repealed in 1817. Then whisky could be manufactured and sold tax free until 1862, when the expenses of the Civil War were paid to a large extent by new excise taxes and have been continued at varying rates ever since under the internal revenue laws.

John farmed on various farms belonging to his father-in-law northeast of Hain's Church from August 10th, 1869, until April, 1895, when he acquired one of them. In 1902 he quit farming and moved to Wernersville, but ill health caused his return in March, 1903, to his farm (on which Elizabeth Gertrude, daughter of George and Veronica Hain, lived after her marriage to William Fisher) where he remained with his son Frederick until his death on May 4, 1903. Both John and Rebecca are buried on the eastern cemetery at Hain's Church. He was a deacon of that church, as well as a member of its building committee, during 1878; and prior to 1901 served eight years as a school director in Lower Heidelberg Township.

Later when about seventeen years old she went to a seminary at Annville, Pa. On December 19, 1867, she married Henry B. Werner, a son of William Werner (the founder in 1855 of Wernersville) and Rebecca (Beckley) Werner. In June, 1870, Henry purchased a 230 acre farm, across which the contending armies fought several battles during the War between the States, near Winchester, Virginia, upon which they lived until January, 1875, when they moved to Reading, Pa. John Casper Hain (2), son of George and Veronica Hain, was born about 1724 in Heidelberg Township, Berks County. He was married prior to 1747 (baptismal records of Hain's Church show that Casper Hain and wife were sponsors, June 7, 1747, for a child, Casper Arnolt) to Catharine Laucks. Catharine was born August 20, 1727, died July 20, 1809. Casper died October 2, 1762. Both are buried at Hain's Church. In 1759 tax records of Berks County list Casper Hain paying £23 tax. His will, dated August 21, 1762, bequeaths to his wife, Catharine, £200 and their furniture; £150 to be given to Elizabeth Hain when she became 18 years of age; to Fred Hain when he arrived at the age of 21 years 56 acres of land (25 adjoining the land of Peter and Henry Hain); to David Hain at the age of 21 years 100 acres of land. The remainder of the estate was to be divided equally among his children. (Berks County Will Book No. 1, p. 127.)

Frederick Hehn, executor of Casper Hehn, offered for sale February 23, 1805, 158 acres situated in Heidelberg Township adjoining land of John Fischer, Henry Bennetch and Peter Hehn, 100 acres clear, 30 acres of it in meadow, 2 orchards, balance timber. On it were two log dwellings and two barns.

(1) ELIZABETH HAIN (3), daughter of John Casper and Catharine (Laucks) Hain, was born in Heidelberg Township, May 26, 1750, baptized July 15, 1750, sponsors, William and Elizabeth (Hain) Fisher (aunt and uncle). Conrad came with his parents to Pennsylvania in 1741, and settled in Heidelberg Township, Lancaster (now Berks) County. He was reared on the farm but learned the trade of blacksmithing. When the Revolution began he was one of the active soldiers of the county, and commanded a company raised in Heidelberg Township which became a part of the First Battalion commanded by Col. Henry Haller. This battalion marched to New Jersey in December, 1776,

but the companies returned home without permission because they had not been paid according to the terms of their enlistment. Conrad Eckert is the "Captain Eckard" mentioned by General Israel Putnam as one of the captains who reported that "their companies had run away to a man excepting a lieutenant, sergeant and drummer." His company afterward formed a part of Spyker's Battalion and participated in the fighting at Germantown and White Marsh during the autumn of 1777. Due to a wound received at Germantown, his health became so impaired that he never fully recovered. Upon his return from military service, he carried on farming on the Eckert homestead and farm, near Womelsdorf, until his death August 25, 1791. Conrad Eckert and Frederick Hain (doubtless a brother-in-law) purchased from John Eckert the one moiety of the Big Springs (north of the turnpike between Wernersville and Robeson) for 150 pounds payable in 1795 and 150 pounds payable in 1796.




